THE BREXIT PROCESS



- June last year: voters decided in the referendum that the UK will leave the EU
- March this year: the government gave formal notice to the EU that the UK intends to leave; the ered the start of a two-year negotial entitled
- negotiations are now taking place between representatives of the UK and the EU

THE BREXIT PROCESS



- the negotiations cover:
 - the 'divorce deal': the terms on which the UK leaves the EU
 - 'future relations': the terms on which the UK and the EU will work with each other in the future
- this is a negotiation, so neither side is likely to get everything it wants

TRADE: BASICS



- what is trade?
 - imports and exports
 - goods and services
- why do countries trade?
- types of barriers to trade
 - tariffs (i.e. taxes)
 - 'non-tariff barriers' (other rules and procedures)

UK TRADE TODAY



- as a member of the EU, the UK is part of
 - the Single Market: governs how EU countries trade with each other
 - the Customs Union: governs how EU countries trade with countries outside the EU

SINGLE MARKET



- members: all EU countries plus three others
- core principle: free movement of goods, services, labour, and capital
- not complete, especially in services
- no tariffs on trade between member states
- aims to reduce non-tariff barriers through:
 - harmonisation (e.g. of labour and environmental standards)
 - mutual recognition (e.g. of work qualifications)
- rules are decided by EU members

CUSTOMS UNION



- members: all EU countries plus Turkey
- sets rules on how countries inside the Customs Union trade with countries outside
 - sets tariffs on imports from outside the Customs Union
 - negotiates free trade deals with countries outside the Customs Union
 - allows goods imported from outside the Customs Union to go through customs controls only once, so that goods can cross borders between member states easily
- rules are decided by EU members

OPTIONS



stay in the Single Market

stay in the Customs Union

seek a detailed trade deal with the EU on tariffs and non-tariff barriers seek a limited trade deal with the EU covering tariffs only

leave the Single
Market and
Customs Union
and don't do
trade deal with
the EU

stay close to the EU

cut loose from the EU

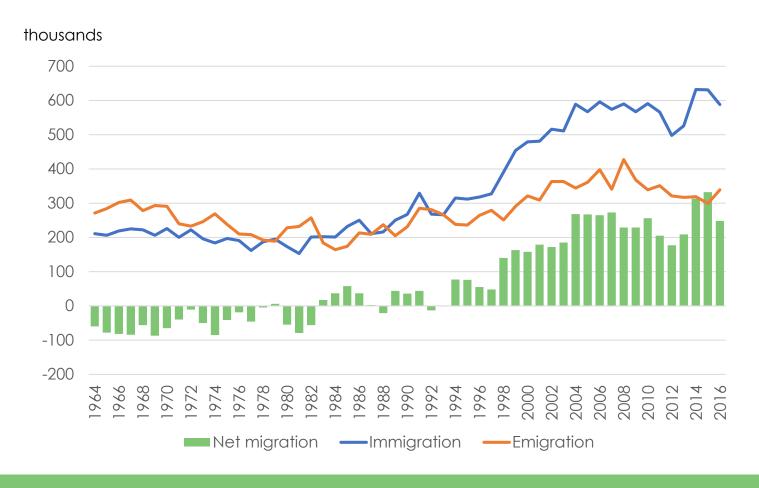
IMMIGRATION: BASICS ONB

 - controlled immigration of people from outside the EU, with visas for work, study, or family members



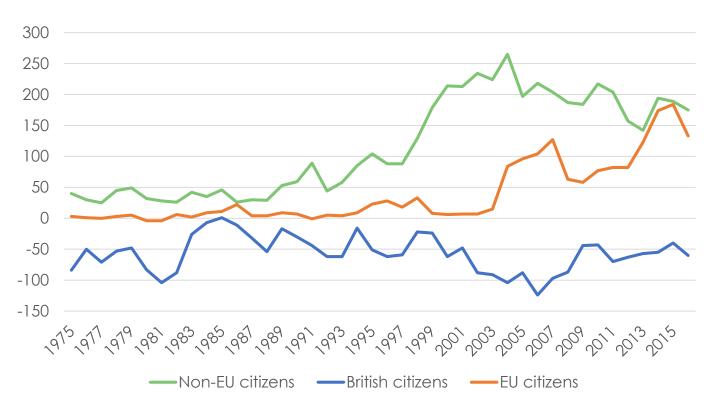
Immigration to and emigration from the UK since 1964





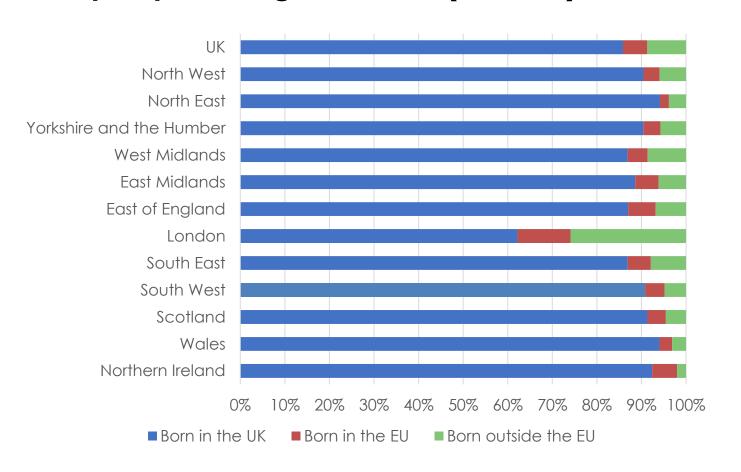
Net migration to/from the UK since 1975

thousands



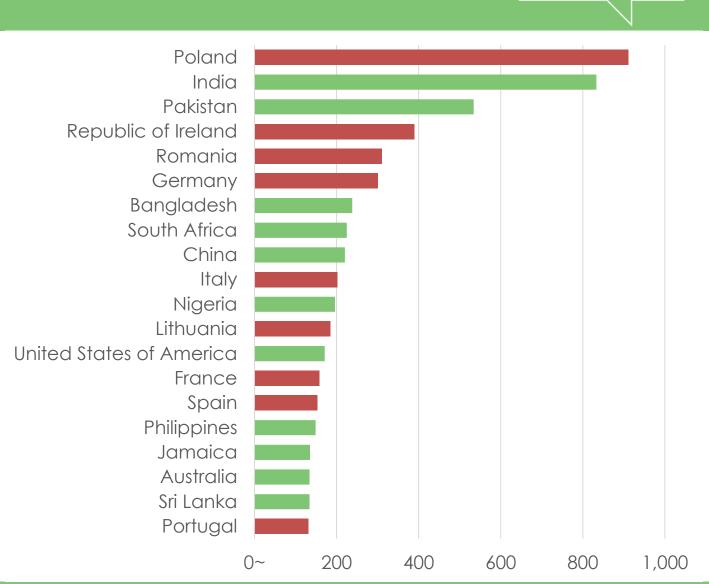


Where people living in the UK (in 2016) were born

OPTIONS



immigration from the EU:

- maintain free movement for EU citizens
- have the same rules for EU citizens and non-EU citizens
- something in between

immigration in general:

- try to reduce it overall
- keep it about the same overall
- target some sectors of the economy where there is a shortage of workers
- different rules in different parts of the UK
