OPTION C Do a comprehensive trade deal with the EU, + favourable access short of free movement


OPTION D Do a more limited trade deal with the EU, with no favourable access for EU citizens

OPTION E


Do no trade deal with the EU, and allow free movement or favourable access

OPTION F Do no trade deal with the EU, and allow no favourable access for EU citizens







