End free movement, but still favour EU citizens


#### **OPTION D**

Same rules for EU and non-EU citizens; total immig. as now


**OPTION E**

OPTION A

OPTION B Stay in the Single Market, with free movement of labour, using available controls


OPTION C Do a comprehensive trade deal with the EU, + favourable access short of free movement

OPTION D Do a more limited trade deal with the EU, with no favourable access for EU citizens


OPTION E Do no trade deal with the EU, and allow free movement or favourable access

OPTION F Do no trade deal with the EU, and allow no favourable access for EU citizens



















#### CITIZENS' ASSEMBLY ON BREXIT
